I ship you today by freight our traveling library No. All charges follow, and when the books are returned, all charges, including drayage, must be prepaid. I enclose a list of the books. If you can publish this list in a local paper before the books reach you, people can preserve the lists to serve as catalogs. We could not afford the expense of printing lists. Make public in the same way, the conditions upon which people can become borrowers, All that is required of anyone is that he shall live in your community and be willing to sign a borrower's agreement to observe the rules for the loaning of the books, and make good all damage and loss that he is responsible for. You can interpret the word "community" as liberally as you please, the more so the better. I suggest that you consider everyone who trades in town or gets mail there a member of your community. You will find it an advantage to have the people on the surrounding farms interested. Please make a special effort to interest the teachers. We are anxious to give the young people all possible opportunity to cultivate the reading habit. Many of the books will be useful in connection with the school work if only the teachers know the books, so it will be well to ask the teachers to look at the books as soon as they come. Please arrange to have the books in circulation all of your three months. Do not lock them up from circulation even for a few days. We want them to have the widest possible use. You will find the librarian's report blank and instructions, and borrowers' application cards in the box with the books. Notify me of the safe arrival of the books, and feel free to write often regarding the work.
